The Pre-Ph. D. course in Philosophy is a full time course involving one semester (Six Months). It is divided in two parts; part one is focused on making students acquainted with major methodologies applied in traditional and contemporary philosophy through paper first and second (compulsory) of 100 marks each, (Credit 4+4).

Elective course focuses its attempts on identifying student's areas of interest for research work through third (Elective) having eight optional papers of various branches of Philosophy carrying 100 marks each (Credit 4 each). The students are supposed to choose any one paper from elective papers.
